ARCHITECTURAL COMMITTEE CHAIRPERSON— ALEXIS DAVIDSON

My thanks to some members who have recently supplied names and contact information for people able to perform small household tasks and maintenance work that do not require contractor level expertise. Some homeowners may be looking for people to help with yard work, so those of you with good experiences in this area of hiring workers are invited to contribute those names to the list as well.

As stated in the last newsletter, we will not consider your suggestions an endorsement on your part, nor will any suggestion from the Architectural Committee be an endorsement. We will merely be passing along a familiar name as a starting place, and homeowners will still need to use good judgment to select a worker.

We just had our beams repaired and capped. The contractor emphasized that for ongoing protection of the beams and roof, keeping the beams and fascia boards painted is one of the easiest and lowest cost ways to prevent damage. While the walls of the house are protected by the eaves, the beams and fascia boards "take a beating" from the weather. He recommends priming and painting the important areas every 1½ to 2 years.

Many, many thanks to the 46 of **YOU** who helped complete the many projects that were scheduled on work day. **YOU** removed weeds, agapanthus and calla lilies, applied snail bait, and pruned ivy on fences; **YOU** placed 20 yards of shock absorbent wood chips in the play area, and mulched azaleas and rhododendrons; **YOU** cleaned pool furniture, cleaned the BBQs, raised and straightened the leaning sprinklers, and tightened bolts on the play equipment; **YOU** removed, washed and re-installed light globes, replaced boards, painted benches, painted pool house walls and fascia, and installed door molding in the men's and women's rest-rooms; **YOU** painted the park entrance sign, completed the concrete pool filter cleaning slab and completed many other minor projects. **YOU DID A GREAT JOB!!!**

- ? Replace ring collar on skimmer box
- ? Replace door closer in women's bathroom
- ? Adjust Zephyr gate closure

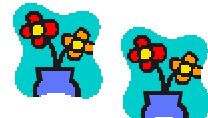
